- ☐ As you watch shows with them, encourage discussions about the programmes they are seeing. Point out positive behaviour, and ask them to compare what they are watching with real events.
- ☐ Children's shows and sport programmes on public TV are appropriate, but soap operas, adult sitcoms, and adult talk shows are not.
- ☐ Common themes of television programmes are violence, drug and alcohol. Teenagers usually think that what they see on television is normal, safe, and acceptable.
- ☐ Finally, encourage your children to be interested in hobbies, sports, and other recreation activities. With proper guidance, children learn to use television in a positive way.
- ☐ Turn off the TV during family meals and study time. Study times are for learning, not for sitting in front of the TV doing homework. Meal times are a good time for family members to talk with each other, not for watching television.
- ☐ Television also exposes children to behaviours and attitudes that are confusing and difficult to understand. That's why you (1) need to view programmes with your children, (2) select appropriate shows for them, and (3) limit the amount of time they spend in front of the TV.

The selected students will stay in Japan for eight weeks. During this period, the students will work as English language tutors for Japanese students at Language Camps for four weeks, and stay with Japanese host families for four weeks.

LANGUAGE CAMPS: The English language program for Japanese students takes place at national campgrounds in various parts of Japan. All campgrounds are comfortable with indoor sleeping and dining facilities.

During the program, the students from America will work with the Japanese students on a variety of English language exercises and activities. They will also participate with them in recreation activities, including excursions to famous cities in Japan.

HOST FAMILIES: On non-camp days, students will stay with volunteer families. Most families have at least one family member who speaks English. When it is not possible to find a host family, some students will stay in a youth hostel or hotel.

LOCATION: The program takes place at different cities all over Japan. Possible areas include: Tokyo, Okayama, Osaka, and Nagasaki. Other areas may be added to this list.

DATES: Departure from the United States will be on July 1. Returning date will be on August 27.

COST: Students will pay \$750 to cover:
health/travel insurance,
food and lodging, and
all travel and round-trip expenses.
