Air pollution has negative effects on people, animals and plants. It can cause minor health problems such as eye and throat irritation, but it has more alarming effects such as cancer and damage to the respiratory systems.

A recent research has shown that air pollution may cause brain damage. In this research, scientists have exposed 200 dogs to air pollution in Mexico City, one of the most polluted cities in the world. As a consequence, the dogs have developed damaged brain cells. The researchers say that the dogs have brain problems similar to those of human Alzheimer's patients. In a separate study in Canada, researchers have exposed human volunteers to air pollution in a laboratory. The results show a link between air pollution and heart problems.

There is a lot of air pollution now because of factories and traffic jams in cities. However, Air pollution is not just a city problem. The toxic pollutants from cars and factories travel for long distances and affect lakes, rivers, and forests

The damage people have done to the environment is considerable. By cutting down trees, people have destroyed animal habitats. They have also taken away a source of oxygen. In Morocco, nearly half the argan forest disappeared in the 20th century. This has caused vast desertification in the region.



Most of us don't see the effect that our consumption of paper has on forests. Since 1970, industrial companies have destroyed over 14% of the Amazon rainforest. This is about the size of France. Amazing! By using as much paper as we do, we destroy a forest the size of a football field every two seconds- over 43,000 football fields every day!

Deforestation: Causes and Effects



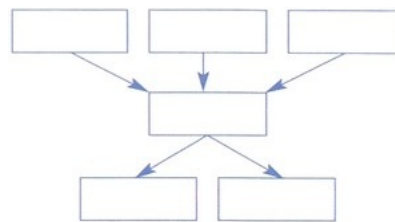
The statistics are alarming. More than 80 percent of the Earth's natural forests have already disappeared. Up to 90 percent of West Africa's coastal rain forests have vanished. In Brazil and Indonesia, which contain the world's two largest areas of rain forest, the number of trees is decreasing rapidly. All this is the consequence of logging, fires, and land-clearing for agriculture and cattle-grazing.

Seventy percent of the Earth's land animals and plants reside in forests. So, one of the consequences of deforestation is the loss of living space. Secondly, rain forests help generate rainfall in many countries. Studies have shown that destruction of rain forests in such West African countries as Nigeria, Ghana, and Côte d'Ivoire has caused about twenty years of droughts in the interior of Africa.
